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TOWN OF MANCHESTER'S NEIGHBORHOODWORKS! CONFERENCE TO EMPHASIZE COMMUNITY-BUILDING

Manchester, CT — The Town of Manchester's Department of Leisure, Families and Recreation is piloting a one-day, pop-up NeighborhoodWorks! Conference on Friday, May 27, 2016 from 8:00 a.m-4:00 p.m with the goal of inspiring community-driven initiatives. The conference will take place in an unconventional location—the former Nathan Hale School—because the site serves as a pertinent example of a vacant public building that is in the process of being repurposed to address vital needs within the neighborhood.

The NeighborhoodWorks! Conference is open to anyone interested in knowing more about creating connected, safe, healthy, beautiful, and generous communities where they live, work, or attend school. Professional community builders; activists; town, school and agency staff; and neighborhood residents from all backgrounds are welcome and encouraged to attend.

The conference will kick off with a keynote address—Creating Thriving Neighborhoods—by Bill DeMaio, Superintendent of Newington Parks and Recreation. Drawing on his 15-year tenure as a municipal-level Americans with Disabilities Coordinator, as well as over 30 years as a parks and recreation director, DeMaio has worked tirelessly to encourage local businesses, schools, and civic groups to break down barriers and make their city a better place to live, work, and play. In the morning, "Learn Track Sessions" covering a wide variety of relevant community-building topics are scheduled to be held between 9:45-11:00 a.m. A special one-hour panel discussion, Neighborhoods That Work for Everyone, will follow at 11:15 a.m. This moderated question-and-answer session promises lively conversation, and maybe even a little debate, as professionals from a diverse range of fields take questions about how to create inclusive and equitable neighborhoods while maintaining economic and environmental sustainability.

Conference participants will be able enjoy lunch for no additional charge at 12:30 p.m, while participating in an elective "Lunch LearnShop and Tour" with a focus on Repurposing Public Buildings for the Public Good. Professionals from Manchester's Department of Planning and Economic Development and the Office of Neighborhoods and Families will discuss how mindful redevelopment can turn shuttered buildings into important community assets. Tours of the former Spruce Street Firehouse (now the EastSide Neighborhood Resource Center) and the Nathan Hale building will also be offered. Following a second series of Learn Track Sessions in the afternoon from 2:00-3:15 p.m, the conference will conclude with a closing address—Leadership That Makes a Difference in Our Community—by Rachel Hyman, Manchester Public Schools Family Resource Center Coordinator. The message will focus on how leaders can create real change by having the courage to listen to the stories of the communities they serve.
