Artistic Expression of Transgender Youth

Tony Ferraiolo, *President, Jim Collins Foundation* Breakout Session I

Transgender youth have a voice that is rarely heard. Through artwork, trans youth can give voice to their experiences and feelings. Artistic Expressions of Transgender Youth is a unique workshop presented by Tony Ferraiolo, CPC. Tony shares with his audience his one-on-one experiences working with transgender youth and the realization that trans youth don't have gender identity issues — it is often everyone around them who has an issue with their gender identity. The workshop will showcase a slide show of actual drawings created by members of Tony's youth groups, Translation and Create Yourself. The drawings are the artistic expressions of answers to questions like "Draw what anger feels like," and "What makes you sad?"

Tony Ferraiolo is a Certified Life Coach, public speaker, trainer and advocate for transgender youth. In 2008, he founded several groups to address the needs of all family members of transgender and gender non-conforming children and teens. The groups were designed to provide a complete support system for the entire family. Beyond this list of inspiring accomplishments, Tony is known for infusing his stories of the struggles of transition with insight, humor, and compassion. Additionally, Tony is the Co-Founder and President of the Jim Collins Foundation an organization that raises money to fund gender-confirming surgeries for the transgender community. Tony has dedicated himself to promoting competent and respectful health care for the transgender community, educating providers and advocating on behalf of patients.

Gang / Group Identification & Knowledge

Sergeant Jason Amato, Bridgeport Police Department Breakout Session III

This presentation concentrates on how gangs operate, their make-up and the crimes they are now involved in. This presentation will also show the violent acts gang members commit and the numbing effects these gangs cause in our communities, how schools can identify youth gang activity and how we can help to keep schools safer.

Sergeant Jason Amato is a member of the Bridgeport Police Department and has been for the past 16 years. Sergeant Amato is currently assigned to the State Police Gang Task Force and has over 14 years of experience in the field of narcotics investigations, firearms investigations and other related criminal activities pertaining to Gangs. In 2010 Sgt. Amato was assigned as the Gang Intelligence Sergeant for the City of Bridgeport and while working in conjunction with the State Gangs Task Force has made hundreds of Gang related arrests. Sgt. Amato uses the information that is obtained through these investigations and street level sources to educate and inform not only other Law Enforcement and State Agencies but the community in how to work with and combat gang related violence.

Let's Talk About It: Responding Supportively to Youth Disclosures of Sexual Violence

While 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys will experience sexual violence before they celebrate their seventeenth birthdays, sexual violence is not something we talk about freely or easily. This workshop will explore how to respond supportively and proactively to disclosures from the youth you work with, as well as highlight what resources are available across the state of Connecticut. Participants will also delve into the impacts of sexual violence and have an opportunity to learn easy trauma-informed intervention methods.

Beth Hamilton is the Associate Director of the Connecticut Alliance to End Sexual Violence (formerly CONNSACS), the statewide coalition of community-based sexual assault crisis services programs. Beth has nearly two decades of experience working to end violence throughout the state of Connecticut including sexual violence, domestic violence, and violence against LGBTQ people and people with disabilities. Beth has been a leader in the development and implementation of statewide policies addressing and preventing sexual violence in Connecticut's K-12 schools, on college campuses, and within Connecticut's correctional system. Beth is responsible for the oversight of The Alliance's programmatic, communications, and training divisions, as well as manages The Alliance's Post-Conviction Victim Services program which houses 14 specialized victim advocates who work with the state's Sex Offender Supervision Units in parole and probation. Beth previously worked at the Connecticut Coalition Against Domestic Violence (CCADV), Connecticut Women's Education & Legal Fund (CWEALF), and directly serving victims of sexual and domestic violence. Beth is dedicated to the prevention of violence, creating opportunities for survivor-lead advocacy, and building anti-oppression movements. Beth can be reached at beth@endsexualviolencect.org.

Elise Delacruz is the Training and Technical Assistance Coordinator for Connecticut Alliance to End Sexual Violence. Prior to joining The Alliance, she worked as a counselor advocate for LGBTQ survivors of sexual violence at the Women and Families Center. She has worked in a variety of positions providing services and advocating for survivors of sexual violence, police violence, and anti-LGBTQ violence. Elise has facilitated trainings on sexual violence, bystander

intervention, child sexual assault, sexual violence intervention strategies for incarcerated youth, and the dynamics of the LGBTQ community. She coordinates the Women of Color Caucus Against Sexual Assault, as well as provides technical assistance to outside agencies. Understanding and embracing racial, ethnic, cultural, and religious difference (among others) is a key factor in enabling mentors to effectively form meaningful and impactful relationships with mentees who hold different identities than their own. This workshop will help increase the capacity of mentoring programs and their mentors to identify and access strategies and resources that will enable them to provide relevant services to the diverse populations of youth and families receiving mentoring services.

Rebekah Behan holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Child and Youth Psychology and joined The Partnership in January 2017. Prior to that she was Youth Services Coordinator at Klingberg Family Centers, with an extensive background in youth development, prevention strategies, and mentoring services. She was a devoted contributor to the local interagency services team throughout New Britain, and the provider co-chair of the Greater New Britain Community Collaborative. She has a background in residential treatment, therapeutic afterschool care, and community-based services. She provides oversight to the Juvenile Justice Mentoring Network and the federally funded Mentoring NOW project as a former local mentoring provider for the New Britain Juvenile Court District for the past 5 years.

Liza Makuch is a doctoral candidate in the Learning, Leadership, and Education Policy Program at the University of Connecticut. Liza holds a B.A. in Human Development & Family Studies from the University of Connecticut and an Ed.M. in Risk and Prevention from Harvard University. In addition to her work at The Partnership, Liza's work in health education and policy includes positions with Eastern CT State University and the Eastern Highlands Health District. Early in her career, Liza developed an understanding of the transformative power of policy in shaping communities and addressing issues of social justice in health and education. Her personal and professional mission is to work for more equitable policy development and implementation in our society. She is writing her dissertation which uses an intersectional lens to understand the relationship between the experience of stigma and academic and social success of female college students.

Catherine Barden is the Coalition Coordinator for MADE in Madison, a Drug-Free Communities Grantee serving the shoreline town of Madison, CT. Before coming to MADE, Catherine worked at The Governor's Prevention Partnership serving as Program Manager for Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Department. Catherine also served as Youth Chair of the CT Coalition to STOP Underage drinking between the ages of 17 and 21, where she found a passion for building strong youth leaders to create long-lasting environmental changes. Catherine has been a member of the CT Assoc. of Prevention Professionals (CAPP) for six years, and has served as their Secretary and Treasurer. She has served on the state Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee, MADD CT Board, and is a founding member of KEYS (Knowledgeable Empowered Youth Succeed).

Cristal DePietro is the Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator for Lymes' YSB, a CSC Grantee serving the towns of Lyme and Old Lyme. Before coming to LYSB, Cristal worked as the Prevention Coordinator for Youth and Family Services of HK and before that spent 10 years working in the mental health field. Cristal serves on the Board of the At Risk Boys Fund, as well as on the Board of CT Association of Prevention Professionals (CAPP). She is also a founding member of KEYS and hosts two Youth and Prevention based radio shows on ICRVRADIO.com

Using Reflective Practice to Engage Students, Schools, and Families in Authentic & Productive Conversations

Amy Alamar, PhD Breakout Session III

High expectations and a diverse set of responsibilities can lead to a disconnect between youth, families, and community support services. This interactive workshop will introduce practical strategies to address this disconnect through discussion of research on student engagement. Dr. Alamar will introduce reflective practice, a research -based, educational concept. Participants will have a chance to apply the practice in real-life scenarios. Along with developing communication, this session will help participants find the confidence to depart from their comfort zone and to begin making stronger and more authentic connections with students, families, and colleagues. The beauty of this session is that it helps to implement an educational concept that, while requiring effort, does not take a lot of extra time to practice regularly. It helps you to tweak your current practice step by step in an effort to use what you know to your advantage. **Dr. Amy Alamar** has worked in the field of education as a teacher. teacher educator, researcher, parent educator, and education reformer for over fifteen years. In 2014, her first book was published. Parenting for the Genius: Developing Confidence in Your Parenting through Reflective Practice (For the Genius Press). The book is a comprehensive guide to becoming the most thoughtful and confident parent possible, with anecdotes and details relating to the guidance and support of children in specific age ranges throughout their formative years. In 2016, Dr. Alamar was an invited guest of Michelle Obama at the White House for a conversation about kids' health. Dr. Alamar was the host of Parenting from the Trenches on Yellowbrick.me and is a contributing author to the Disney parenting website, Babble and Psychology Blog, Hey Sigmund. Her second book, The Parenting Project: Build Extraordinary Relationships with Your Kids through Daily Conversation (Fair Winds Press), will focus on communication strategies and is due for publication in Fall of 2018.

Dr. Alamar is married and the mother of three children whom she learns from and enjoys each and every day. She is a resident of Avon, CT, where she serves on the board of the Watkinson School and the Avon Education Foundation, dedicated to promoting and enhancing excellence in education.

Youth Homelessness: What You Need to Know

Carl Asikainen, Youth System Coordinator, Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness (CCEH) Breakout Session II

The system of services for youth experiencing homelessness is coordinated statewide with new specific resources coming into communities during the fall of 2018. In the context of this system Youth Service Bureaus have an important role to play regarding identification, outreach and having the knowledge and ability to quickly move a youth at risk of homelessness or literally homeless to appropriate services. This session is an overview of data about homeless youth and coordinated access, a description of the resources available regionally to help youth, and an introduction to Youth Engagement Team Initiatives (YETIs) meeting throughout the state to address youth homelessness. Attendees will come away with a fundamental understanding of the system of services from entry (211) to exit (diversion, shelter or housing) for youth, including minors.

Carl Asikainen comes to CCEH with 20 years of experience working to address food insecurity and homelessness. Most recently, Carl worked as a Food Systems Manager at TEEG, a human service organization that lends aid and support to communities of Northeastern Connecticut. Prior to that, Carl worked as an outreach worker for End Hunger CT! and for Project Home in Philadelphia. Currently he is the Youth Systems Coordinator at CCEH working throughout CT helping to advance community capacity building efforts to end youth homelessness.
